Letter to Catechists

Dear Catechists,

At time of writing, my wife Kerrie and I are less than 2 weeks away from the incredible opportunity of attending the World Meeting of Families (WMOF) in Rome to be held from June 22-26. We have been privileged to be members of the Australian Catholic Life Marriage and Family Council (ACLMFC) since 2019 and were invited to attend in that capacity. It is a real honour to have been asked, humbling and at the same time, quite daunting.

Kerrie and I grew up in the same Parish of Our Lady of Fatima Caringbah, where the faith of our families and our personal faith was nurtured. I know it is a personal choice about having a helper, but for me a helper assists in making the lesson flow well. It is always special to pray with the class and the helper at the beginning of the lesson giving a great sense of unity in loving and serving our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.
